### XXXII. Incline Your Ear unto My Law

Psalm 78

This paraphrase of selected verses from Psaim 79 distills the tone of communal lament that runs through that psalm. Because the sense of shame and the longing for restoration extend to the whole community, this psalm is usually associated with the Jewish exile in Babylon.

This hymn is a 21st-century adaptation of the traditional Celtic prayer style known as a larica (Latin for "armor" or "breastplate"). Many such petitions for God's presence and protection were never written down, but this one is based on an example attributed to St. Patrick.
