Remembering Our Baptism

Prelude Verset No. 1 on "Creator of the Stars of Night" by J. Titelouze (1562-1633)

"Creator of the Stars..." is a medieval Advent hymn long thought to have been written and composed by Saint Ambrose, but now known not to have been. Titelouze was a Norman French priest, organist, and composer whose music represented great forward strides for the art form, although today's audiences sometimes find his music more meditative than exciting.

Lighting of the Advent Candle of Hope

On this first Sunday of Advent, we come to the Advent wreath to light the first candle, the candle of hope. (The candle is lit)

Hope is optimistic, trusting, sustenance for the soul.

Hope is necessary for humans to survive, just like air and water and food.

Hope is a sprig of leaf in the beak of the dove returning to the Ark.

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

# 92 While We Are Waiting, Come




## 94 Now the Heavens Start to Whisper

The "it" of the first line of this text by a Unitarian minister does not refer to the birth of Jesus, but to "that glorious song of old," the angelic tidings of peace on earth. The restored third stanza laments how often the noise of human strife has obscured that message.
