MEDITATION

"HEARING GOD'S VOICE"

In 1st Samuel, Chapter 3, we hear the story of Samuel hearing God's voice in the night. Samuel was ministering with Eli at the temple in Shiloh, where the ark of the covenant was kept.

The first time Samuel hears a voice calling his name, he runs to Eli and says: *"Here I am for you called me."* Eli told Samuel that he had not called for him and said that Samuel should go back and lie down. This same thing happens two more times and each time Eli tells Samuel to go and lie down.

Eli perceived that God was calling Samuel. So, the next time Samuel hears a voice and goes to Eli, Eli says to Samuel: *"Go back and lie down and if the Lord calls you say, 'speak, Lord, for your servant is listening'"*. The Lord told Samuel some amazing things, some of it not so pleasant to hear. Samuel does what the Lord tells him to do. From Dan to Beer-Sheba (in other words from the north to the south of Israel), Samuel became known as trustworthy servant of the Lord.

Like Samuel, we do not always know when the Lord's voice is calling us. God does call to each of us but the challenge in hearing God's voice is that there are so many other voices calling us to 'do this and do that'. In the midst of all the other voices, we oftentimes miss God's voice.

How do we prepare ourselves to hear God's voice? Like Samuel, we practice our faith and try to be around other spiritual people. Like Samuel, we spend time alone with ourselves. I believe God most often speaks to us, when we are alone with ourselves. In other words, God speaks to us in the silent spaces of our lives. Being alone with ourselves and enjoying silence is the best gift we can give to ourselves.



Other types of TIS are: making/purchasing items and sending them to people in need; donating money for a mission fund initiative; providing mission interpretation & education for the whole church; developing personal relationships with PCUSA Mission Agency Mission Co-workers.


200 KNITTED HATS FOR NEWBORNS

Do you know how to knit or crochet? Do you have small amounts of colorful left-over yarn with no idea what to do with it? Why not make hats for newborn babies? Drawing on JoAnn Burrell's suggestion that we could design our own mission project or activity, I decided to make hats for neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) babies. I was spurred into action last April by a flyer on my church's bulletin board requesting knitted hats for newborns.

I am no wizard at knitting. In fact, I do not know how to knit with the traditional 'knitting needles'. I do not know how to read patterns, nor do I have the desire to learn. I make the hats while relaxing and watching my favorite TV programs and having to study a pattern would distract and detract from my relaxation. Each hat takes about two hours to complete. It is done with a round hoop with prongs, a hook and big-eyed plastic needle -- a very simple process! For the first row, just wrap the yarn twice around the prongs, then use the hook to do an overlap of each prong. Thereafter, continue to wrap the yarn once around each prong to complete the overlap. With practice, you can be a little more creative with the wraps and overlaps for a more intricate design.

Thanks to my friend Rose Wood for getting me "hooked" and for helping to spur on my project with a contribution of 30 hats. And thanks too, to my 'big' sister Iris (an expert 'needle' knitter) for adding seven beautiful pink hats to my collection. With their contribution, my initial goal catapulted from 100 to 200 hats. In another week I will deliver 100 hats each to the neonatal units of two area hospitals.

"SISTERS IN SPIRIT" MENTORING PROGRAM (PWNP 2017-2018 PARTNERSHIP WITH BLOOMFIELD COLLEGE)



The Presbyterian Women Newark Presbytery INTERCOM wants to highlight and feature in this edition Bloomfield College student extraordinaire Ina Geathers, a senior and psychology major. PWNP met Ina through the "Sisters In Spirit" (SIS) Mentoring Program developed by Rev. Teri Ofori, the former Director of Spiritual Life/Chaplain at Bloomfield College, to help support female students by providing Christian mentoring through a series of programs, activities and one on one support. PWNP was asked and encouraged to engage with the "Sisters In Spirit" initiative. Five members of the PWNP Coordinating Team served as mentors. Although Rev. Ofori has now transitioned to Ursinus College in Pennsylvania, the hope is that "Sisters In Spirit" will continue at the College and that PWNP will continue to engage and provide mentors and support for the Program.

Ina Geathers will graduate from Bloomfield College in the spring in 2019. Ina was born in Livingston, NJ and raised in Sommerville, NJ. She is the seventh generation of New Jersey residents and is proud to say that she is the third generation of her family to be named "Ina." She recalls readily the influence her grandmother had on her life, even though she passed when Ina was six years old, which she said, instilled in her the value of faith, history and purpose.

Ina shares that the "Sisters in Spirit" program is very important in helping young college students to fulfill their destiny and purpose through their Christian faith. She recounts her struggles as a Christian student leader. She has experienced ridicule and discrimination from other college students for her faith. She states that students struggle to develop their personal identity and move into their independence and knows that spiritual mentoring can provide needed guidance.

Ina participated in the two-day SIS Retreat with PWNP mentors held at Stony Point, NY in May 2018 and also attended the PW Churchwide Triennial in Louisville, KY in August. This was her first trip to Louisville and she enjoyed the experience immensely. She stated that being there with women of faith, sharing their gifts, talents and abilities was inspirational and empowering. She would like to see more young women included in the future.

As a young Christian woman, Ina says her family's faith influence has helped her to struggle, fight for and believe in her herself. She supports the need for continuing the *"Sisters In Spirit"* initiative at Bloomfield College, to provide a platform for support to help young women to grow in faith and in themselves, to secure their identity, purpose and destiny. It is our hope that the Presbyterian Women of the Newark Presbytery will continue to lend our prayers, action, leadership and support for the *"Sisters In Spirit"* Mentoring Program.

HIGHLIGHT\$ - PW CHURCHWIDE GATHERING Louisville, KY - August 2-5, 2018

"Arise, Shine, Your Light Has Come" was the theme that drew over 1,600 women to Louisville, Kentucky for the 2018 Churchwide Gathering of Presbyterian Women held August 2-5. The Gathering was even more significant because it marked the 30-year celebration since PW became a united organization with the (1988) merger of the women's groups in the northern and southern regions under the PCUSA banner. Over a dozen women from the Newark Presbytery attended the Triennium and cheered along

our very own JoAnn Burrell as she was installed to the churchwide office of Vice Moderator of Mission Relationships. Locally, JoAnn serves as Together in Service Coordinator for our Newark Presbytery Coordinating Team. (See her report on page 11 of this newsletter). JoAnn cites Hebrews 12: 1-2 as a guide that keeps her focused on her ministry on behalf of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ:

¹Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. I look forward to hearing your stories and being a weaver of stories in many accents... I, as moderator will be calling out y'all to "arise and shine". Arising and shining implies action; it is not a fashion show, not that kind of shine where we walk down the aisle displaying glitter. Rather, we will help each other arise and reflect God's glory. God has already called us to arise. I am awed by the grace and mystery of God who brought me and PW to this juncture. I look forward and am excited about what wonders God might do through all of us PW!"



She professed a saving hope in Jesus Christ and was baptized at the age of 12 while growing up in the New Liberty Baptist Church. Rev. Tom grew up serving in the church in various capacities and believes that she was, "born to serve God" as she notes in her personal mission statement:

I believe that God has called me to lead by teaching, preaching, and serving the people of God in ways that model Christ's love for the church. I respect and celebrate the diversity and humanity of all people."

The benchmarks of Rev. Tom's ministry are her desire to: advocate for those whose voices have been muted, and to train

Rev. Vernon, NY in June 2011-January 2018.

Rev. Tom is a lifelong learner, social justice advocate and spiritual teacher and leader. She is an active member of the National Association of Presbyterian Clergy Women, serves on the Advisory Board for the Presbyterian Hunger Program, PCUSA. Rev. Tom is an active supporter of the Interfaith Workers Justice and Westchester Jewish Council. She is also the former Convener for the Education Committee, for the Interfaith Clergy for Social Action and a member of the United Black Clergy, Mt. Vernon, NY. In Hudson River Presbytery, Rev. Tom served on the Hudson River Presbytery's Cross-Cultural Network, and Emerging Ministries Teams. Rev. Tom is a philanthropist, an avid football and basketball fan; she enjoys reading, writing, good jazz music, collecting books on prayer, water aerobics and swimming.

Rev. Betty Tom is the wife of the Rev. Philip Tom, the newly appointed Executive Director of International Council for Community Churches. DISCOVER YOUR SPIRITUAL GIFT AND USE IT

In his book, *Discover Your Spiritual Gift* and Use It, Rich Yohn says that God has made provisions for us to experience as much power and ability as we will ever need to live at top efficiency. "The potential is within us if we've had a personal relationship with Him."

God has given us the Word, His power, His character and spiritual gifts with which to accomplish His work. "As each one has received a special gift, employ it in serving one another as good stewards in the manifold Grace of God." (1 Peter 4:10)

According to the author, most Christians do little else but attend church and would rather leave the ministry up to the pastor and specialists, such as the minister of music or the Christian Educators. This results in about 20% efficiency, and God did not design the church to function at low efficiency.

Since it is God's desire that all church members participate in His church, each person has been given a special which, when developed, can be used to His glory.

Yohn categorizes these gifts like this: Ministry of helping (giving, showing mercy) Ministry of directing others (leadership) Ministry of the Word (teaching, preaching, music, exhortations)

Ministry of the spectacular (miracles, tongues and interpretations)

Finally, he explains that there can be but one kind of church member: one who is **active**.

LEST WE FORGET

He was a prophet of the 20th Century, a silver-tongued orator, an ambassador of peace. But, suddenly, the "midwife of oppression had snatched from the womb of the world this child of destiny".

This man, barely approaching the afternoon of his existence, was as the blazing sun of noon, casting rays of hope upon those who had remained in darkness and despair for so long and parching the souls of those who committed inhumane acts of bigotry.

Then a madman, a product of our psychopathic society, eclipsed this "sun", casting the world into utter darkness. Death came quickly, and it seemed as though the sun had gone down while it was yet day.

Darkness, hurt, pain and sorrow – and a part of each of us died. Yet the One who is able to free us from a morbid sense of fear and trepidation declared, "Weeping may endure for a night, but joy will come in the morning". (Psalm 30:5) Surely, the night did end, and a new day did appear.

So, when we remember Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., let us not reduce his remembrance to our dwelling on his untimely demise or reciting his "I Have a Dream" speech, ad nauseam. Instead, let us commit ourselves to stand for something ... lest we fall for anything!

WELL DONE, THOU GOOD AND FAITHFUL SERVANT" Matthew 25: 23

It was with great sadness that we were informed of the untimely death of the Rev. Dr. Katie Geneva Cannon, a highly esteemed figure in the Presbyterian Church (USA). She died on August 8, 2018 following a diagnosis of acute leukemia. She was 68 years old.

Dr. Cannon was a graduate of Barber-Scotia College (BS degree), Johnson C. Smith Seminary (Master of Divinity) and Union Theological Seminary (PhD). She was a professor at Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, VA. In addition, she was a prolific author emphasizing womanistic theology and the Black experience.

Dr. Cannon, the first African American Woman to be ordained in the United Presbyterian Church in the USA (in 1974), represented the "power of faith and love despite the tensions of both race and gender struggles within the denomination and academy. Her ordination gave rise to a new call to the understanding of the denomination and the African American community". (*J. Herbert Nelson, 11, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, Presbyterian Church (USA)*

"At a young age she saw the disconnect between much of the Christian message and the heavily segregated world in which she had lived. Born in Kannapolis,

NC, she was puzzled by the fact that she could not use the local swimming pool or the library because it was against the law. She was a fundamental voice in womanist theology which seeks to escape the white male-centered views of religious ethics and to value the experiences and insights of Black women in those areas." She was a scholar, a prolific writer, a professor as well as a servant-leader. She will be missed greatly by all who have had the distinct pleasure of being in her company.

Dr. Cannon was invited by Charlotte Cade to be the guest at one of our Presbyterial (a forerunner of PW) Retreats held at Tuscarora Inn along the Delaware Water Gap in Bethel, Pennsylvania. In addition, we participated in one of her Bible studies during the Triennium at Purdue University, where she was a guest speaker.

The Gospel of Matthew relates the parable of the talents. The Master, when he was going on a journey, issues talents three of his servants. When he returned, he asked for an accounting of what each had done with what was given him. One gave a mediocre, but acceptable report. Another, who attempted to blame the Master for his own downfall, was cast into utter darkness. However, the servant who proved productive was told, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant. Enter into your Master's happiness". That, to be sure, was The Rev. Dr. Katie Geneva Cannon.






PILL PUZZLE SOLUTION:
