Dear friends,



As Christians, much of our faith is cyclical in nature. Cycles of birth, life, death, and resurrection from generation to generation. Cycles of gathering, worship, and sending in Christ's name each week.

Life together as the Body of Christ is also divided into liturgical cycles centering on periods of preparation followed by periods of celebration. The expectation of Advent leads us to the joy of Christmas. The hard work of Confirmation Class leads to the celebratory claiming of faith by adolescent believers. A mustard seed of faith leads to baptism, the love of two people leads to a marriage in God's name, even death itself gives way to the celebration of eternal life with our Creator.

In the months of March and April we will enter another liturgical cycle of preparation and celebration: the Lent-Easter season.

Lent is a time for reflection and repentance as we prepare for the glory of Easter. What part of our life could use atonement, restoration, reparation? What can we let go of for the sake of orienting ourselves more fully toward God? What can we take on or begin anew for the same reason?

Though the work of Lent is serious, it need not be somber. Our reflection, questioning, and seeking are a means to free us from burdens so we may even more fully celebrate God's love at the empty tomb on Easter morning.

This Lent, I hope you will make a special point to attend the Seven Locks Ecumenical Lenten Series. We'll move from church to church through the weeks sharing dinner, fellowship, and programs. This year our theme is a bit tongue in cheek: "1, 2, 3...Not It! A Conversation on Call and Action." The pastor of each participating church (including me!) will share from our personal stories as we talk about God's call: how it's different in every person's life, how to know when it's authentic, and how to respond when God comes knocking. A full schedule is included in this issue of *The Radiant*.

Please also mark your calendar for March 28 at 1:00pm for a one-time event: my Service of Installation as Pastor of Geneva Presbyterian Church. This worship service is an official action of National Capital Presbytery where we will celebrate the new things God is doing at Geneva Presbyterian Church with churches, friends, and pastors from all around the region. There's a reception following, too! Great worship, celebrating our church family, and yummy food: what's not to love?

In this issue of *The Radiant* I'll share two more thought provoking books I've read recently:



The Second Mountain: The Quest For A Moral Life by David Brooks

Brooks is a regular contributor to *The New York Times*, *PBS NewsHour*, and *Meet the Press*. In this book he explores a "two mountain" shape to life: a move from the self-centered first mountain to the other-centered second mountain. Brooks quotes from a range of Christian (Barth, Tillich, etc.) and interfaith sources to build his case that a truly meaningful life is built on interdependence and commitments made beyond the self.



Wade In The Water by Tracy K. Smith

As a poet, Tracy K. Smith writes in images to put on paper those deep human experiences that often remain just outside our ability to articulate. As Poet Laureate of the United States, Smith speaks specific truths that must be said at this moment. Her collection of poetry is engaging, unflinching, and boundary pushing. Of particular note for me are her "erasure poems," wherein she creates poetry by selectively deleting large portions of primary source documents, including the Declaration of Independence and letters written by African Americans enlisted in the Civil War and their family members.

May God's grace and peace be with you as a faithful guide this Lent and Easter season.

March: Psalm 51:10

"Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me."

Psalm 51 is traditionally read on Ash Wednesday and is a profound accompanying verse for our Lenten journey to Easter. Repentance, a true turning back to God in word and action, is a key

part of the Lent season. Self examination, honesty with our Creator, and asking for help -- it's all here in this one small verse!

April: Ephesians 2:8-9

"For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God -- not the result of works, so that no one may boast."

The Presbyterian Church, which flows from the Reformed theological tradition, places special emphasis on grace: God's freely given love that depends only on God's goodness. However you understand salvation, it is God's free gift to the world through Jesus Christ. We cannot earn our own salvation with good works. We cannot do or refrain from doing anything that will make God love us any more or any less than God already does. We are completely, totally loved by God: our responsibility is figuring out how to live in light of that wonderful news.

Update from the Clerk of Session

There is a cartoon published in the New Yorker magazine a while ago entitled "A Presbyterian Thanksgiving". The single panel drawing features a large family seated around a holiday table brimming with food, table settings, centerpiece and, of course, a large turkey. At the head of the table, the patriarch of the family is addressing the table: "Before beginning the celebration of this year's Thanksgiving, we will have a reading of the minutes of last Thanksgiving dinner." A Presbyterian Thanksgiving, indeed!

When I first encountered that cartoon, I was not yet a Presbyterian and so the fullness (and aptness) of the humor eluded me. Having first come to Geneva in the autumn of 2001 and joining soon thereafter, I have come to appreciate that cartoon considerably. All the more so after I became Clerk of Session in early 2014. As Presbyterians, we embrace order, rules and *minutes*!

Prior to being nominated to the office of Clerk of Session, I declined twice when asked by Rev. Anne if I would serve as Clerk. Not wishing to follow Peter's example of three-times denial, on the third persuasive pitch by our dear former Pastor, I accepted. And now as I am completing my second of two three-year terms of service, I am looking to share the opportunity with someone new.

Obviously, the past few years have been years of transitional change. This evolution at GPC is expected to continue in the upcoming years. For the sake of consistency and smooth functioning, I have been asked by Pastor Patrick and Janelle T. (as head of Executive Committee and the Nominating Committee) to stay in the role of Clerk of Session for a bit longer. I have agreed to do so—tentatively for the next six months—or whenever the next Clerk can be found or gently bamboozled into service.

So what does the Clerk actually do? In a nutshell, there is more than the recommended adult dose of record-keeping . . . there is submission of such records to various governing bodies (the National Capital Presbytery being a principle one) . . . there is officiating at certain ceremonies

(baptisms, acceptance and presentation of new members, presiding over certain elections etc.). . . there is setting the Session docket (agenda) and participating as an Elder on Session.

On the downside there is a fair amount of minutia in regard to official rules and procedural issues—a former Geneva Clerk of Session from a decade or two ago described the work of the role to me as "not hard, but very precise". On the upside, the Clerk has among the clearest views of the functioning of our beloved church and the chance to actively participate therein. And one has the considerable joy of working closely with the wonderful officers, staff and other church leaders of GPC.

I am not sure I have done a very good sales job here—but if you have any interest in the office please seek me out for more information. At that time I will likely dish out the wondrous blessings of the role by the heaping handful—and to find someone to take my place will truly be cause for a Presbyterian Thanksgiving for me (and for GPC)!

Geneva Sound System Update

You may have noticed that our church audio has been having intermittent problems lately. This is caused by some recent changes to the public airways that became official this January. The FCC has elected to sell off certain bandwidths used by wireless microphones for use by mobile phones. Our new handheld microphones use the 600 MHz band. These are our newest microphones, purchased in December 2018. But the FCC sold off the 600 MHz band starting in January 2020. Rendering these devices effectively worthless. Sennheiser, the manufacturer has offered a small discount for trade-ins, but it's not much compared to the investment we made to buy them.

Our Lavalier mics, which are used by Pastor Patrick and the Lectors use the 500 MHz band which is still legal. But because of the change to the 600 MHz band, more operators are now using the 500 MHz band. This causes interference, which is impossible to predict. One Sunday, the lector microphone worked fine before the service but erupted in a large noise during service. It had to be turned off. We later re-programmed it for a different frequency in the 500 MHz range, but there is no easy solution for this problem if it occurs during the service.

Geneva received a generous donation from the estate of Owen Allen which was earmarked for the sound system. We're looking into upgrading our microphones, choir mics, and other older equipment. So, there are some sound improvements coming in our future, but there's little we can do about the over-crowding of the airways.
