Dear friends,

After a wonderful summer, fall is arriving and the change in season is accompanied by a change in rhythms of life. Geneva Presbyterian continues to be "on the move" as a dynamic family of faith living into God's call to discipleship for our day and age. This includes honoring the roots of our life together at Geneva while also reaching toward the future where the Holy Spirit is leading us.

On that note, I am excited that Geneva has begun a search for our next Christian

Education staff member! This position will be officially titled the "Director of Next Generation Ministries" to emphasize their focus on forward looking ministries in our church family. This will include ministries with young people, families, technology (like social media), and "next generation" things we might not even know about yet! We are certain that the Holy Spirit will be guiding us to connect with the right person through a process of prayerful discernment and interviewing.

With the changing of the seasons, I will be resuming Wednesday Night Bible Study on September 15 @ 7:00pm -- same time, same place (Zoom), even the same link that we've used previously. We will continue diving deep into rotating selections of scripture and connecting it with our daily lives. If you're looking to connect with a "small group" at Geneva, want to have a weekly spiritual practice, or you desire to engage with scripture in a fun setting, this is the place for you -- and there's no better time to give the group a try than now!

Starting Sunday, September 12, we will enter into a four week sermon series called "Being Presbyterian 201". We've talked previously about many core "101" tenets of being Presbyterian (God's sovereignty, God's grace and salvation in Jesus Christ, God's providential action in the world, scripture as God's inspired Word). Now, we'll take things a bit further as we consider topics such as why Presbyterians love committees so much (there actually is an explanation!), the idea of "mutual forbearance" and its impact on our faith, and what it means that the Presbyterian Church (USA) is a "connectional church."

As part of that sermon series, I'll talk a bit about something called the "Per Capita Apportionment", also known simply as "Per Capita." Per Capita is a specific dollar amount that each Presbyterian is asked to give each year to support the costs of ministry for the Presbyterian Church (USA) as a whole, most notably of our local denominational body, National Capital Presbytery. The Per Capita amount for 2021 is \$42.67 per person on the church roster, which means that Geneva Presbyterian Church pays the denomination \$42.67 per person in our church community. It is a helpful expression of our "faithful togetherness" for each of us to donate this amount to Geneva per person in the household to help meet our church's obligation as a member of the Presbyterian Church (USA). If you are interested in paying "your Per Capita" now, please be in touch with the church office or make a donation designated "Per Capita"

This summer I purchased my first Weber Kettle grill and began learning about grilling and smoking meat. In true "Patrick fashion," this also meant that I watched a lot of YouTube videos and read some books on the subject. A Disability History of the United States by Kim E. Nielsen

The back cover of this book says it all: "Covering the entirety of US history from pre-1492 to the present, A Disability History of the United States is the first book to place the experiences of people with disabilities at the center of the American narrative." I found this book enlightening, thought provoking, and appropriately challenging, especially as our congregation seeks to center the experiences of people with disabilities as part of our Christian life of discipleship.



Devotions: The Selected Poems of Mary Oliver by Mary Oliver

Mary Oliver is an enduring name in American poetry, but this book is my first exposure to her work. I was captivated from the first stanza of the first poem of the collection, "I Wake Close To The Morning" from 2015: "Why do people keep asking to see / God's identity papers / when the darkness opening into morning / is more than enough?" This is a 442 page anthology covering a lifetime of work - in other words, a book to be savored through time rather than read all at once.

This summer we had some beautiful weather and then some... sweltering weather. I'm very pleased we're moving to cooler, pumpkin spice driven, sweater weather.

In July I was able to attend the Massanetta Church Music Conference wherein I worked with the choral conductor and arranger David Schwoebel and the handbell extraordinaire Ed Thoompkins. Short story time: When I was growing up in Ashland, VA, David was the music director for Derbyshire Baptist Church. They would put on the most incredible Christmas concerts. In my absence, my friend and colleague Patrick Merrill was able to step in as music director for the summer. I hope you enjoyed his excellent keyboard skills and video editing abilities. He and I met on zoom a few weeks ago so that he could show me a thing or two about video editing. In the last few Sundays of August you may have noticed a change in the hymn videos. I'm working on refining my video editing skills so that you can better sing along to the hymns from home. Towards the end of August I made announcements that we're looking for a few new singers and ringers. If you're interested, we meet on Saturdays. Geneva Sanctuary choir meets 11:00-1:00 and our Handbell choir meets 1:00-3:00. I also provide snacks to sweeten the deal. The choir joins us for worship starting September 12. Each Sunday we will have some form of special music. We also have the good fortune to have four paid singers again: Amber Wood (Soprano I), Katie Bogdan (Soprano II), Jessica Bennett (Alto), and Derrick Truby (Tenor/Baritone.) This will allow us to do a wider variety of repertoire and include smaller ensemble/solo works for worship. Geneva Day School completed a successful 2020-2021 school year of live classes with very little interruption to regular operation during the pandemic period. Last year, no students tested positive for COVID-19, and no staff were positive since early December. With the variants arriving in the area, however, we are concerned about the impact to the school. The Summer Program was also a huge success with 9 weeks of various recreational themes which were reflected in activities, story books, snacks, games, and special programs. Some of the favorites were creek walks, the circus show, a foam party, and farm animal visits.

In preparation for the new year, all classrooms, bathrooms, and halls were painted, floors were washed and buffed, furniture and rubber mats were hand cleaned, and other necessary maintenance was provided. Teaching teams were busy moving things back into place and arranging classrooms to accommodate a few more students in each.

Staff and students returned to Geneva with negative PCR tests, as well.Updated COVID-19 Operation Guidelines were distributed to families and staff prior to school starting, all of which signed a Wellness Pledge to respect them.

During the staff's return weeks in August, they participated in various training on First Aid, AED, and CPR, Handbook and Guidelines Review, Child Abuse and Neglect, and Executive Functioning. Meetings were also held to refine practices for the new year.



Several staff are planning to continue college education by completing their Bachelor's degrees in Social Work or Education, with another beginning a Master's in Educational Leadership. We are proud of their efforts to keep abreast of the profession and further their skills.

Geneva is engaged in a Best of Bethesda Campaign as sponsored by the Bethesda Magazine for Best Pre-school and Best Summer Day camp, which are listed on page 7. We appreciate everyone's vote!

The Executive Committee has been very busy working on neighbor issues, space usage, supporting the Sound Booth renovation team, and acting as the personnel committee.

The Sound Booth team has done an amazing job managing the process of expanding our sound booth, and finding a contractor to complete it. Thank you to the Sound Booth team - Tom Sadler, Ken Denaburg, Ken Sprinkle, Janelle Thibau, Patrick McElwaine, and everyone else who participated in the project!

A special thanks to Jim Harris for his continued help with neighbor issues that have come up this year. As a result of these issues, the Executive Committee authorized a boundary survey to clearly establish our property lines. A survey was done in 1992, but the exact location of markers from that survey were not easily found. Due to continued neighbor issues, we will be installing a split rail fence on several of the property lines, which will join existing neighbor's fences.

The conversations regarding the new AV equipment and space usage led to a conversation about the churches renting space from Geneva. It was decided (after much discussion) to end our relationship with Iglesia de Dios. We plan to continue renting space to Mi Fiel Pastor and to Men in Recovery. However, due to the concerns of the Delta variant, we will not allow our tenants back until after September. The Day School students are not eligible for Covid 19 vaccinations, and we do not want to put them at risk until we know more about this variant. There are several projects that the Executive Committee is working on, including replacing the wooden frame work behind the brick front of the right side of the church. With so many people doing work on their houses, getting quotes is the current hold up. We are also getting quotes for some maintenance work on the Manse to keep it safe from rodent intrusions.

The Executive Committee has also been working with Pastor Patrick to develop the job description for the Director of Next Generation Ministries, as well as having a committee member participate in the performance review meetings for Ben Shaver and Melissa Cutler.

If you have any questions or ideas for improving our building or grounds, please let me know. I am very pleased to work with such a dedicated group of people.

My knowledge of what the Clerk of Session did was encapsulated in the following statement. "The Clerk of Session is the person who takes the minutes for the Session meetings."

Over the past 6 months, I have found that the Clerk of Session does a whole lot more than just take the notes of the Session meetings. In my digging into the Clerk of Session files, I found an Introduction to the Manual for Clerks of Session that the Stated Clerk of the National Presbytery, Dick McFail, wrote. In that Introduction he wrote: In the words of Frank Beattie in Companion to the Constitution, "The clerk is the nearest officer in a Presbyterian church to the 'lay leader' or 'chairperson of the congregation' in other denominations." This is because of the close working relationship between the Clerk and the Pastor/Moderator. Together with the Pastor/Moderator, the Clerk shapes the agenda for the Session meetings, and consults about its work. My first thought was what had I gotten myself into. Then I realized that I was following an amazing line of Geneva Clerks of Session: Mark Allen, Larry Blim, Alan Price, Audrey Pike, Nancy Judkins, Connie Strain, and Susan Frey. I hope I have not missed anyone. I am honored to be Geneva's current Clerk of Session.

In reading the Manual for Clerk of Session of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A), I find that there are twenty (20) responsibilities of the Clerk of Session. The first one being "Keep a full and accurate record of the proceedings of the session." The second one being "Keep the roll of session membership and attendance." NO, NO, I'm not going to go through all 20 responsibilities in this report. What I plan on doing is to highlight the rest of responsibilities in future reports sprinkled in with a few historical facts about Geneva Presbyterian Church.

COVID-19 has been hard for many and our mission is to help whoever we can, wherever we can! We will continue this mission activity into the fall. As I write this, we have just reviewed and approved financial statements as of July 31, 2021. That puts us at a little over half the way through our fiscal year. So, how are we doing?

Well, the good news is that offering and pledged giving is actually a little ahead of budget – thank you, Geneva members and friends! In addition, we are also slightly ahead of budget projections – helped by the fact that our expenses (as of 7/31) are just under 44% (instead of the projected 58%). However...

There's been serious discussion about finding and hiring a "Director of Next Generation Ministries". We've had a line item in our budget for this position the past few years, but we have not (yet) hired this new person. As a result, our proposed deficit budgets have been better than projected – we haven't spent the money allocated for that position. I believe that this will soon change.

When Patrick answered the call to become our minister, we promised him that a CE / Youth minister would be hired. If we are to grow as a church, we will need to attract younger families to become members. To do this, we will need a program in place for youth. That's part of what the new position would entail. If we build it, they will come . . . As we continue to get through this Covid situation and get back to "normal", we will most likely continue to operate under a deficit budget. That means we will continue to spend more than what we take in as income. Although we have the financial resources to do this, the goal is to grow our church with members who will contribute, financially and otherwise, so that we can operate with a balanced budget.

That will happen, but it will take time. In the meantime, we will continue to move forward, one step at a time. We have a wonderful new minister (okay, not so new anymore, but still wonderful!); an amazing new sound system; the sanctuary will once again be open for in-person services; we will have a new staff person to recruit and provide family programs – it's an exciting time for our church, and I am looking forward to our future!

Peace and Global Witness Special Offering to be collected on October 3, 2021

On World Communion Sunday, October 3, 2021, we celebrate that Christ's peace extends throughout all creation. We celebrate that we are all together at the communion table, in God's house. We celebrate that we are offered what we need to continue the work of building the household of God, with active peacemakers here at home and around the world. Extending the peace of Christ is part of an active, engaged faith—a witness to what it means for us to be the Church, together.

Through the participation in the Peace and Global Witness Offering, Geneva is extending Christ's peace throughout our community and our world. We begin at the communion table, with our siblings in every time and place, and we celebrate the peace we find there and commit to building a more just and peaceful world. We celebrate the truth found in 2nd Thessalonians, "Peace at all times in all ways."

25% of our offering will stay with Geneva for use in local missions. 25% goes to PCUSA for use by mid councils to unite congregations to support peacemaking in their regions. 50% goes to PCUSA Mission to support the work for peace and reconciliation being done by Presbyterians across the globe.

A Light in the Clearing

When the prophet Elijah, deep in the throes of an existential crisis, fled to Mount Horeb in search of God, he was met instead with the sound of sheer silence.

Natalie Pisarcik knows just how he felt.

"There was a time in my life where I was on the bottom," Natalie testified during Sunday worship in her home congregation, First Presbyterian Church of Boonton, New Jersey. "I cannot even describe how hard and difficult that time was. Only those who have been there know how it feels."

Natalie's story recollected a significant turning point in her life. "On that fateful day, I went for a walk in a wooded area where I kept repeating over and over in my wounded brain how I would end the pain. As I walked, I came across a field, which oddly seemed to call to me. As I walked into the field, a beam of warm sunlight hit my face. It was at this exact moment that I realized I had a made a terrible mistake. It was like God was saying to me, 'What are you doing? You have a reason to live.' I was so overcome."

Natalie found herself compelled to address the growing mental health crisis not only by sharing her story with her church, but also by getting her congregation more involved. The church's board of deacons was persuaded to take immediate action to address the suicide crisis.

Because deacons in the Presbyterian tradition are called to a ministry of "compassion, witness, and service," the board voted to designate the church's share of the Peace & Global Witness Offering to support the New Jersey Chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, an organization in which Natalie had participated for years.

Natalie's personally moving experience resonates anew during the pandemic, and underlines the importance of this work. "Sadly, and tragically, our community has lost more people to suicide in 2020 than it has to COVID-19," said Natalie.

Through the Peace & Global Witness Offering, congregations are encouraged and equipped to find and address the anxiety and discord that is prevalent throughout world. The offering supports ministries that work for reconciliation and facilitate healing. Half of the Peace & Global Witness Offering goes to the national church to address these issues around the world, 25% is retained by congregations for local peace and reconciliation work, and 25% goes to mid councils for similar ministries on the regional level.

Natalie has a message to share with us all during these unsettled times. She reminds us to "listen and look for the light, and remember that you have a purpose, too. God is with you."

Let us pray:

Loving God, when we walk in the valley of the shadow, remind us that we are only steps from your light. Draw nearer to life, by the arms of our shared ministry, all who feel hopeless, lost, or deserted into your loving embrace, into the warmth of your sight. **Amen**.
