This African American spiritual offers a long-delayed answer to the prophet Jeremiah's question, "Is there no balm in Gilead?" (Jeremiah 8:22). No earthly remedy can compare with the healing that comes from a sense of God's presence; nothing else can heal "the sin-sick soul."

Music Arr. © 1990 Melva Wilson Costen BALM IN GILEAD 7.6.7.6 with refrain One day, while he was teaching, Pharisees and teachers of the law were sitting nearby (they had come from every village of Galilee and Judea and from Jerusalem); and the power of the Lord was with him to heal.* Just then some men came, carrying a paralyzed man on a bed. They were trying to bring him in and lay him before Jesus;^{*} but finding no way to bring him in because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and let him down with his bed through the tiles into the middle of the crowd^{*} in front of Jesus. When he saw their faith, he said, 'Friend,^{*} your sins are forgiven you.' Then the scribes and the Pharisees began to question, 'Who is this who is speaking blasphemies? Who can forgive sins but God alone?' When Jesus perceived their questionings, he answered them, 'Why do you raise such questions in your hearts? Which is easier, to say, "Your sins are forgiven you", or to say, "Stand up and walk"? But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins'-he said to the one who was paralyzed—'I say to you, stand up and take your bed and go to your home.' Immediately he stood up before them, took what he had been lying on, and went to his home, glorifying God. Amazement seized all of them, and they glorified God and were filled with awe, saying, 'We have seen strange things today.'

About the Music ...

In the Old Testament, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed that this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief of their oppression. He reminds them that He is ultimately in control, and only He can relieve their suffering. In the New Testament, God answers the suffering of His people by sending His own son to take our place. Jesus becomes our "balm in Gilead." It is Him we are called to turn to in our times of trial for healing and comfort. We sing this song with that assurance: no matter our hardships or supposed shortcomings, Jesus loves us enough to take our suffering upon Himself.

When first published in 1931, "Lord of All Hopefulness" (previously titled "All-Day Hymn") seemed very daring for not using traditional archaic pronouns to address Christ. Current pronouns no longer disturb, but the comforting Jesus portrayed here needs to be balanced by his call to discipleship. This version of the hymn is set to music composed by David Schwoebel who was the Music Director of the Derbyshire Baptist Church in Richmond, VA. I admired him greatly when I was growing up and his church's Christmas

• Updated COVID Guidelines!

Session has approved an updated set of COVID Guidelines for Geneva Presbyterian that are in line with changing pandemic guidelines and the needs specific to our congregation. Please review and abide by these guidelines to keep our community safe if you come to Geneva in person.

Update Approved Nov. 22, 2021

- 1. Masks will be worn inside the church building and social distancing will be practiced. If a person is unable or unwilling to wear a mask, they may join us online for worship at this time.
- 2. The Pastor and Liturgist may remove their masks while leading worship in the chancel area.
- 3. The sanctuary will open for worshippers at 10:15.
- 4. Please enter through the main glass doors on the Seven Locks Rd. side of the building.
- 5. Check in procedure: all worshippers will provide their name for contact tracing, answer the standard "COVID questions," and have their temperature checked upon arrival. Hand sanitizing stations and masks will be available.
- 6. If any member of a household has a temperature above 100.4 degrees the entire household will be asked to leave and worship with us virtually until safe to return. If you don't feel well, please don't come to church in person.
- 7. Greeters will help with check in and questions. Ushers will guide worshippers to their seats in the sanctuary.
- 8. Child care is being offered in a downstairs school classroom. Masks are encouraged if a child is able to wear one. An Usher can help guide caregivers and children to the child care space.
- 9. Individually sealed communion cups will be provided upon arrival for services when we celebrate the Lord's Supper.
- 10. Offerings and donations may be made online or in the physical offering plate located next to the sanctuary doors.
- 11. The congregation may sing with masks on.
- 12. Geneva Day School areas are strictly off limits to maintain safety for students and staff (with the exception of child care during worship).
- 13. Please obey all posted signs and do your part to keep our community safe!
- 14. These guidelines apply to everyone equally, regardless of vaccination status.
